What is a recycling baler?

Recycling balers are used to compact recyclables such as aluminum, cardboard, paper, and plastic into blocks which can easily be stacked and transported. The blocks of recyclables that come out of balers vary in size and weight depending on how big of a baler you have. There are many different kinds of balers, but balers used specifically for recyclables are usually called "vertical" balers. There are some small horizontal balers on the market. They are compact and can fit in a 20' connex. The horizontal balers produce tighter bales (recycling companies sometimes pay more for tighter bales).

This company sells a small horizontal baler (model 710) for under \$14,000 (not including shipping). To make a bale of aluminum cans with this baler, you need about 3,000 cans (which is similar to the amount needed to make a bale with a vertical baler). The weight of a bale of aluminum from the 710 baler is about 150 lbs compared to 125 lbs with the small vertical balers.

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Note: some communities use one baler to bale their solid waste as well as recyclables. Examples of successful recycling baling systems

Haines, Alaska

Haines in Southeast Alaska has a great recycling program called the "Haines Friends of Recycling" group. The group uses a GPI S60SD recycling baler for the following items:

- Aluminum cans
- Paper
- Plastics
- Scrap metal

They had to upgrade the door so when paper is loaded they can tie the bale before opening the door; otherwise the paper just squirted out. Users will need access to pre-tied baling wire made for the machine.

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Gustavus, Alaska

The 400 person Southeast community of Gustavus runs a great recycling program. They use a recycling baler to bale aluminum, cardboard and plastics. They use a Cram-a-lot baler (model: DH-42R) which produces pallet size bales. A Bobcat is the used to move the bales.
